# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

*Fleecefield is centred around a community that experiences high levels of deprivation and social and emotional needs. Most of our families are from low socio economic backgrounds with limited access to resources to meet their physiological needs. We work with and support our families from the moment their journey begins at Fleecefield.*

*At Fleecefield, we have the highest expectations for all our pupils. Most of our pupils enter Early Years with lower than average starting points, including poor language acquisition and more often than not, very limited or no English. Our focus is on ensuring these pupils receive high quality teaching and bespoke early interventions. Through accurate tracking of pupils' progress, we aim to ensure that our pupils catch up and keep up throughout their time at Fleecefield.*

*Through our carefully planned curriculum, we provide pupils with experiences to support not only their academic learning but also with their social and emotional development. The opportunities provided for them, we believe, builds resilience, confidence and a strong sense of self-worth as well as developing their cultural capital.*

*Our priority for our pupils at Fleecefield, is through both the academic and enrichment opportunities we provide, pupils will gain the knowledge needed, to make informed choices that will have a positive impact on their life chances and the wider community.*

## Challenges

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

#### Outcomes for 2022/2023

Through the analysis of data - both statutory and internal outcomes - we have been able to identify the impact of activities implemented throughout the year 2022/2023. Impact has also been seen in reports from external reviews that have been carried out by the schools SIA. Peer review and RWI development days.

*Challenge 1: Language development and acquisition – children arrive at Fleecefield in EYFS and throughout the school with very little or no English (86% of the school with 38% of children PPG/EAL)*

Through exposure to explicit teaching of vocabulary, reading lessons and addressing the language barrier through phonics and early reading/new to English groups, children develop reading skills that are built year on year. In the EYs interventions are run to support language development - LASS/Little chatterboxes. In the Early years there is a language rich environment, which is seen through the quality of the interactions both in the continuous provision and focus activities. Phonics is taught systematically following RWI. Robust assessments allow for children to be identified who need additional support. Internal data shows that all children make good progress and in some cases PP children make better progress than non PP children.

*Challenge 2: SEND children who have specific needs relating to Speech, language and communication on the SEND register - 50% of children on the register are PPG.*

- Silver class - bespoke teaching for children with ASD and Communication needs, which include activities such as Bucket and PECS
- Successful implementation of mixed ability teaching (referenced in reports from external reviews)
- Walkthrus selected, are having a positive impact on outcomes and supporting pupils to be confident in speaking and refining what they say
- Robust assessed interventions - L4T, LASS. Red Write Inc KS2
- Internal data shows that children with SEND all make good progress this is also demonstrated in Learning Journals (EYs/KS1) and E-learning journals (KS2)
- KS2 outcomes - year 6 SEND children made accelerated progress in all areas

*Challenge 3: Reading - many children are not exposed to or have access to quality texts at home. Families are not always aware of the types of texts that are available or how empowering they can be to young people.*

- Reading for pleasure project/PoR in EYFS and KS1 exposing children to more

high quality books

- Reading displays in all year groups
- Inviting and well resources reading areas in all classrooms
- Children able to make recommendations to friends and teachers
- Mrs Jetto's virtual library via Google classroom
- Book recommendations in weekly letter to families
- Daily stories in class/weekly assemblies
- Mapped texts across all years to ensure a wide range of books are accessed

Challenge 4: *As a result of high levels of deprivation – pupils lack enrichment experiences and cultural capital. 90% of PPG pupils are eligible for FSM. The school's deprivation indicator is significantly higher than the national average of 0.225.(2019).*

- Every year group has planned visits/visitors linked to their curriculum
- After school Sports, Art, Music and Spanish clubs
- Music workshops as part of Cultural events
- Curriculum workshops
- A number of opportunities through ECP throughout the year e.g. Platinum performing arts

*The school is a reflection of the cultural and ethnic diversity of the area as the majority of our children are from homes where English is an additional language. Our children come from many cultures and speak several languages (currently 38) and the majority start school with very low-level language skills.*

*In order to ensure our children make good or better progress we are robust in following the advice and support given to us through regular monitoring and evaluation from the CEO, SIA, LA, HEP and external consultants.*

*Some families find it very difficult to engage with school life, and as a school, we support a community that faces a range of challenges. Our PP numbers do not reflect the high level of needs of our most disadvantaged families who have no recourse to public funds and are therefore not eligible for free school meals. Everything we do is framed around supporting our families, ensuring inclusion and addressing the disadvantages of all our children.*
